

### Nation's Foremost Designer of Golf Courses Also Local Visitor

Jack Munger of Dallas, nationally known amateur golfer, and Perry Maxwell of Oklahoma, one of the country's foremost golf course architects played a round of golf at the Shreveport Country club Saturday in a foursome with Abe Espinosa, the Country club's famous teacher, and Edwin McClure, local amateur, who was the visitors' host.

Munger is present holder of the southern amateur golf championship, and in 1933, at the age of 18, was semi-finalist in the national amateur championship played in Cincinnati.

Long regarded, despite his youth, as one of the nation's leading amateurs, Munger is one of the few amateur golfers invited to participate in the Bobby Jones Master's Open championship to be played next week in Augusta, Ga., and following his play there he will compete in the North and South amateur championship in Pinchurst, N. C., later returning here to participate in the Ark-La-Tex Invitation tournament to be at the Shreveport Country club, April 16, 17 and 18.

Maxwell has designed some of the best golf courses in the nation and is now engaged in laying out a course in Hutchinson, Kans., which is destined to become one of the finest in the United States. The course will be constructed among sand dunes, which will lend the appearance of an English seaside course.

The University of Michigan course in Ann Arbor is another of his fine designs, while Southern Hills in Tulsa is recognized as the leading course in the Southwest.

Maxwell also revamped such famous courses as Pine Valley, Oklahoma Country club, Twin Hills Country club, scene of the P.G.A. tournament last year, and the Philadelphia Country club.

Maxwell expressed a keen interest in the local course, and said with certain improvements, it could be made one of the best in the Southwest district.
